ATTENDANCE POLICY

At Caplora, we aim to arrive on time or earlier for lessons and extracurricular activities as well.

- 1.1 Students will be expected to report back for a new term within the first week and are required to attend all classes. Students failing to report back by the second week of the term without informing the school will be required to write an official request to be allowed into class.
- 1.2 Lessons run from Monday to Friday.
- 1.3 Classes begin at 8:00 am and end at 3:00 pm.
- 1.4 Students must be punctual for all virtual lessons
- 1.5 In the event that a student is late, the school will record the learner as late. Students who are perennially late shall receive two verbal warnings before a warning letter is issued to them by the school administration.
- 1.6 Morning and lunch breaks are 60 minutes long after which students are expected to return to classes punctually
- 1.7 A student must attain at least 75% attendance in each class assigned. Failure to which a warning letter will be issued to the student whose attendance fails to meet the requirements. A student is allowed a maximum of three(3) warning letters before disciplinary action is taken.





DRESS CODE

The following dress code will apply:

- 1. Students will wear a tee-shirt, polo shirt, sweatshirt
- 2. Students will wear appropriate shorts, pants or skirts.
- 3. Sweats in good condition are allowed.
- 4. There is no need for virtual classroom attire to be Caplora affiliated, just appropriate for a classroom setting.

Clothing Items Not Allowed:

- 1. Tank tops
- 2. Halter tops
- 3. Spaghetti strapped tops
- 4. Any shirt or blouse exposing any area above the waist.
- 5. Any shorts, or skirts that could be considered revealing or distracting
- Any item of clothing with inappropriate writing (ie. advertising alcohol, drugs, or any topic contrary to any religious theology.)

While the dress code for the virtual classroom is much more relaxed than the traditional school uniform, students are expected to dress and be groomed in a respectful and appropriate manner. The appropriateness of virtual classroom dress /grooming is always at the discretion of the COO, Principal or Class teacher.

- 1.9 Give parents information regarding school news, activities and policies.


 These include newsletters, school events, open days and opportunities for parents to participate in school events

OUR EXPECTATIONS AND HOME SCHOOL AGREEMENT —

As a parent you will be required to:

- 1.1 Make sure your child(ren) will be on time for in-person classes and virtual sessions.
- 1.2 Ensure that they attain at least 75% attendance for each class assigned.
- 1.3 Support your child(ren)'s development by monitoring their academic and social progress, and taking steps towards improving them.
- 1.4 Follow the school's policies regarding attendance, dress code, school stationery, assignments and behaviour.
- 1.5 Attend parents' meetings to discuss progress and objectives for improvement.
- 1.6 Ensure that school fees are paid on time





OUR EXPECTATIONS AND HOME SCHOOL AGREEMENT -

As a student of Caplora you will be expected to:

- 1.1 Maintain the highest rate of attendance and be punctual for classes..
- 1.2 Have the necessary stationery and equipment for classes and extracurricular activities.
- 1.3 Do your best to complete my assignments.
- 1.4 Share what you learn with your parent(s)/guardians and disclose any concerns.
- 1.5 Observe the school policy on behaviour within and outside the school.
- 1.6 Exercise tolerance and respect when learning about people's cultures, beliefs, customs, traditions, festivals and feelings
- 1.7 Seek help and speak to a trusted adult if you are unhappy, anxious and in difficulty for any reason.
- 1.8 Deliver communication between your parents and the school without delay.
- 1.9 Conduct yourself in a disciplined manner and maintain respect for peers and teachers
- 2.0 Submit all assignments in the required time. If unable to do so, seek teacher approval to make alternative arrangements.
- 2.1 Write tests and examinations at the time(s) scheduled, adhering to the established procedures when writing examinations and comply with the Examination policy
- 2.2 Respect the right of the teacher to deport you from the virtual classroom if you are deemed disrespectful, disruptive or use words, gestures or act in a manner that threatens violence or abuse to any group or individual



HOMEWORK GUIDELINES

Total home learning time for any given night will vary. Some children will find some assignments more time-consuming than other children, and sometimes this divergence will vary according to the subject.

Students are expected to engage in independent reading or reading with family members for at least twenty minutes a night in addition to assigned homework. This valuable time spent reading is important in the development of all students.

If home learning is consistently taking considerably more or less than the time suggested above, or if the student insists that "we never have any homework in that subject," then there could be a communication problem. The parent should contact the teacher to address this misunderstanding or any problems which may exist in the way the student is addressing the assignments.

Objective of homework

- 1.1 To give students the opportunity to reinforce, revisit and combine their learning.
- 1.2 To help students learn further and in-depth.
- 1.3 Take different approaches in learning primary skills between home and school.
- 1.4 Cultivate independent learning, inspire students and strengthen learning in classes.
- 1.5 Encourage students to come up with long-term approaches for future needs.
- 1.6 Extend learning and challenge the student outside of the classroom, specifically in activities related to their academics.

N/B

Teachers are not required to set homework over holiday periods or at times where students are taken on in-term vacation breaks

STUDENT DEVELPOMENT PROGRAMS (Year 10-13)

Service Learning

This is a foundational element of our curriculum. It seeks to develop caring members of the community who act to make a positive difference to the lives of others and their environment. Service Learning requires students to engage with their local community through community or personal projects and provides opportunities for students to explore, design, implement, and reflect on their efforts to positively impact their local environment. Through service as action experiences, students learn the value of community participation and gain a deeper understanding of the issues facing their immediate surroundings.

Industry Experiential Programmes

An early exposure to the real work environment will set the expectations right and prepare them for the working life in the future. It also helps the students understand the industry that they may wish to deepen their skills in when they join University. Some of these programs include:

1. Hospitality

This course provides students with the skills and knowledge to prepare basic western and African cuisine, provide food & beverage service, perform housekeeping and attend to customer needs, requests and enquiries.:

2. Cyber Security

This course prepares students with crucial skills to be responsible citizens in a digital future. It is designed for beginner computer science students with no specific course prerequisites. Students will learn foundational cybersecurity topics including digital citizenship and cyber hygiene, the basics of cryptography, software security, networking fundamentals, and basic system administration.



3. Biomedical science.

The rigorous and relevant four-course Biomedical Science sequence allows students to investigate the roles of biomedical professionals as they study the concepts of human medicine, physiology, genetics, microbiology, and public health

.

Students engage in activities like investigating the death of a fictional person to learn content in the context of real-world cases. They examine the structures and interactions of human body systems and explore the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of disease, all while working collaboratively to understand and design solutions to the most pressing health challenges of today and the future

4. Computing

Software development

When students make apps and website, they learn:

a. Valuable STEAM skills like coding, programming, graphic design, and content creation

b. How to solve real-world problems with digital design.

Whether tackling challenges at school, within the community, or even on a global scale – knowing how to build apps empowers students to meaningfully change their environment through technological intervention

5. Design Studies (DS)

The DS course equips students with knowledge and skills of the design field through design thinking, design process and fundamentals of three design disciplines: visual communication design, interior and exhibition space design, and architectural design. The course aims to nurture an awareness and appreciation of the positive relationships among design, humanity, art, technology, business, culture and economic development. As such, it cultivates an awareness of the role of design in shaping one's experience of visual communication, space, objects and the environment.

Students will develop creative and innovative mindsets, critical thinking and analytical skills through design activities; and acquire the ability to critique design works and generate creative design solutions. Students will also acquire competencies in visual and oral expression and communication, as well as digital design techniques for presenting design concepts. Design projects foster students' responsibility, confidence and sense of efficacy





STUDENT ASSESSMENT

KS1, KS2 and Secondary School Learning Expectations

Progress and Attainment

We evaluate each student's progress and attainment regularly throughout the year, against National Curriculum benchmarks.

Attainment - is the expected level of achievement by the end of the academic year.

Progress - is the child's expected rate of development.

Tracking Student Progress and Attainment

We track students' individual and collective progress and attainment through the use of assessment software.

We use GL Assessments Data is anlaysed, areas of strength celebrated and areas of need addressed. This software allows us to show you clearly where your child is at in comparison to age related expectations

Assessment for learning (AFL) and Differentiated Learning

Assessment is only purposeful when it guides future learning. On a daily basis, students are reviewing past and present learning whilst also looking at future learning so that they are continually creating links to their progress and attainment. Individual learning goals are shared with parents once a term and reviewed frequently in class.

Termly reports of progress and attainment are distributed to parents

Planning to meet Learning Needs

Once the needs of the students have been identified, our staff develop curriculum plans to track students' progress at a pace so that they are at/above expected attainment. Across all subjects, learning is differentiated to meet the needs of the learner.

Teachers plan collaboratively so that there is consistency across year levels and Key Stages

We assists our Students to enter and write British International Examinations for IGCSE, AS level and A Level qualifications with Cambridge International Assessment

The Cambridge IGCSE exam fees ranges between USD 140-180 per subject



FEE POLICY

- 1.1 Full fees shall be due on the first week of the term.
- 1.2 Full fees shall be paid during registration for new students.
- 1.3 Installments will only be allowed for continuing students through prior arrangement with the COO as per the following schedule:
 - 1.3.1 At least seventy- five percent (75%) by the end of the first week of the term
 - 1.3.2 The balance on the first week after mid-term.
 - 1.3.3 Negotiated terms will only be accepted on the first week of the term
 - 1.3.4 Five percent (5%) interest will be meted on balances owed outside these arrangements.
- 1.4 Any student who will not have paid full fees for the term by the end of the first week after mid-term will be denied access to services.
 - 1.4.1 Any student so advised will be disqualified from the term examinations and other forms of assessment.
 - 1.4.2 Such a student will strictly not be allowed to use school facilities for the rest of the term.
- 1.5 Fees once paid are not refundable unless it is an overpayment or the student has not attended any class. In either case, a 10% penalty shall be charged.
- 1.6 Fees can only be carried forward to the subsequent term under the following circumstances:
 - 1.6.1 The student voluntarily withdraws from/ defers the current term after having paid fees and not attended any class. Such withdrawal should be in writing to the COO before the term ends.
 - 1.6.2 Any occurrences within the term that renders the student unable to continue due to physical and/or mental disability. All supporting documents should be forwarded to the School before the term ends.
